Homework



- Reading Logs Reading logs will be handed out for students to keep track of their time reading. The expectation is that students will need to read a minimum of 20 minutes a day, 4 times a week in their "just right" books. Students are encouraged to read more over the weekends.
- Math Students will be given math assignments to practice concepts we have learned about in class. These will be given on a regular basis and your child's teacher will let you know how they plan to send math homework home.
- Writing Please check your child's planner each evening. Writing homework will be given on an "as needed" basis. It will not be given every evening.
- Word Study Your child will have a new set of high frequency
 words each week on Monday, and these words will be assessed on
 Friday. Each teacher will also send word study homework home one
 time a week to review a skill taught during the week and your
 child's teacher will let you know which day that will be this year.
- Unfinished Work If your child has difficulty finishing class work and they have been given a fair amount of time to complete the work in class, they may be asked to take it home and complete it by the next day.

<u>Discipline</u>

Our classroom environment is centered on the belief that all students are capable of being responsible, respectful and safe. Discipline is providing students with the knowledge and opportunity to make positive choices and allowing students to experience rewards and consequences for their actions.
